



**41. ZEBULON VANCE BIRTHPLACE**

**44. CARSON HOUSE, McDOWELL COUNTY**

Trails sign on US 70, a half mile west of Marion town limits – An element of Union Gen. George Stoneman's cavalry raiders skirmished briefly with home guards here April 19, 1865; then "were swarming in and around the house." After plundering the home and scaring the family, Stoneman moved on toward Asheville.

**45. SWANNANOVA GAP, McDOWELL COUNTY**

Trails sign in Andrews Geyser Park on Mill Creek Road off Old US Highway 70, 4 miles west of the Old Fort Visitor Center and Railroad Museum – Confederates consolidated here April 19, 1865, after Union raiders left the Carson House and easily turned back the Northern advance.

**11. CATAWBA COUNTY MUSEUM**

The Catawba County Museum of History features a permanent Civil War exhibit, including the Colonel Clinton Cillely Collection of Confederate and Union artifacts. General Stoneman's troops passed through Catawba County during the war. 30 North College Ave, PO Box 73, Newton, NC 28658 828-465-0383

**24. DR. JOSEPHUS HALL HOUSE**

Dr. Hall was drafted by the Confederacy to serve as physician for the Salisbury Confederate prison. In April 1865 his house became headquarters for Union officers under General Stoneman. Costumed guides. Fee. 226 South Jackson St. PO Box 4221, Salisbury, NC 28145-4221

**38. SALISBURY NATIONAL CEMETERY/CONFEDERATE PRISON SITE**

The cemetery has mass graves containing 11,700 unknown Union soldiers buried in 18 trenches (each 240 feet long) marked by head and foot stones. The graves are adjacent to the former site of a Confederate prison. 202 Government Rd., Salisbury, NC 28144 704-636-2661, Open: Mon.-Fri 7:30-5

**23. GREENSBORO HISTORICAL MUSEUM**

**13. ALEXANDER DICKSON HOUSE**

**35. ORANGE COUNTY HISTORICAL MUSEUM**

**8. THE BURWELL SCHOOL**
